A Community of Innovative Homes, Built with People & the Planet in Mind




IMAGINE...

... a walkable, downtown neighborhood of high performance, all-electric rental and single family homes, wired together in a Direct Current Microgrid that is powered by solar panels on site. Excess power generated by all those homes is automatically stored in Microgrid batteries, so that even if the grid goes down, you and your neighbors have backup power. The homes use super-efficient DC current appliances and lighting. EV Chargers are at every building. No combustion occurs in the homes to lower air quality.



Together they have developed and cared for the 1,547-acre Braintree Mountain Forest, which they donated to the New England Forestry Foundation in 2013.
